From the CEO –Liz Callaghan

This week, Palliative Care Australia (PCA) discussed [The Australian National Guidelines for Spiritual Care in Aged Care](#) Project with Elizabeth Pringle from Pastoral and Spiritual Care of Older People. The project aims to:

- Define best practice spiritual care in contemporary residential, home and flexible care contexts
- Outline responsibilities of pastoral care practitioners, community faith representatives, the aged care workforce and volunteers in relation to spiritual care
- Outline requisite workforce competencies and spiritual care education pathways
- Outline service delivery requirements
- Acts as a platform for the ongoing and explicit inclusion of spiritual care in policy relating to aged care
- Be aligned with all relevant Australian standards and other guidelines
- Underpin two future projects which will aim to create a suite of spiritual care manuals for each service stream, and to develop a toolset to assist providers to implement the guidelines

PCA also held a teleconference with the [Decision Assist](#) project with the Communications Advisory Group (CAG). It was a productive meeting outlining the next steps in the project including promotion of the [upcoming workshops](#). Workshops are being held across Australia for GPs and home care and residential aged care staff. For the workshop details in July please see the next page.

Yesterday the AHHA launched the [new online palliative care training resources](#) for people who support the dying in the community. The new portal will build upon the success of the original award-winning training modules based on [COMPAC Guidelines](#) for community-based palliative care.

Today, PCA is hosting a sub working group meeting of the [Closing the Gap](#) Steering Committee. The meeting aims to further develop the existing work to consider a health in all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander policy approach.

PCA's new policy manager will join PCA on 20 July 2015. Philippa Kirkpatrick has moved from the National Blood Authority. She will be an asset to the team and has much to offer from her background in clinical science, government relations and business.
